Football on the Plains

Who is ready for some Auburn football? Fall is coming fast and the ligers are getting ready to take the field at Jordan-Hare Stadium once again! As an Auburn student you get the opportunity to cheer on your favorite team from the best student section in college football.

The Athletic Ticket Office and SGA has recently released some updated information about Football Tickets. You will still need to register for the lottery between June 7th and before July 18th (11:59pm CST) through AU Access. Once logged in, click the My Campus tab, and then click the "Register for Lottery" in the Student Athletic Ticket Order box As a reminder, you will be unable to order tickets until you have a schedule in place. The lottery will run on July 19th and you will be emailed with the results of the lottery the same day. You will have until August 21st (11:59pm CST) to cancel your ticket package.

In order to give more students an opportunity to get tickets, incoming students will not have the option for a full home season. Instead, you can select a partial season package.



The 2017 packages are:

6-Game Package (2 options) \$120

- ORANGE Georgia Southern, Mercer, Mississippi State, Ole Miss, UL-Monroe, Alabama
- BLUE Georgia Southern, Mercer, Mississippi State, Ole Miss, Georgia, UL-Monroe

4-Game Package (2 options) \$80

- SILVER- Georgia Southern, Mercer, Mississippi State, UL-Monroe
- WHITE- Georgia Southern, Mercer, Ole Miss, UL-Monroe

3-Game Package \$60

 Georgia Southern, Mercer, UL-Monroe

Away Games:

- You must purchase a ticket package in order to be eligible to purchase away game tickets.
 Limit one per student and they are subject to availability.
- The ticket prices are: Clemson \$110, Missouri \$80, LSU \$110, Arkansas \$85, Texas A&M \$90

If your desired ticket package sells out, periodically check the site for cancellations. When someone cancels his or her tickets, those tickets are immediately available in the system for purchase. You can do this through **August 21st**.

The Student Government
Association and the Athletic Ticket
Office have worked together to
develop new Student Ticket Policies
to help make more tickets
available to students, and

limit the number of nonstudent fans in the student section. Be sure to check out the new policies here: wp.aubum.edu/sga/ programs/athletics/ ticketing/

New this year, Students can no longer transfer games. Students can request a **free** ticket for a game they do not have from the ticket pool. You can begin requesting a ticket on **August 24th** and they are first come, first serve. Students are able to request a guest pass after the lottery on **July 19th**. Guest passes will be \$20 for all games except for Georgia & Alabama which will cost \$30

There is also a penalty system for students who do not use their tickets. The best way to prevent a penalty if you are unable to go to a game is to return the unwanted ticket to the pool before midnight the Sunday night prior to the game.

Remember your tickets are held on your Ignited Card which you can get at the Auburn Arena Box Office when you get here in the fall. Be sure to have your Ignited Card with you when you rush into the stadium for the first football game of 2017!

Tips for Preparing to Move to Auburn

- Talk with your apartment complex prior to move-in and ask if there's anything that doesn't come with the apartment that you might need to purchase or set up ahead of time like utilities, internet routers, shower rods, etc.
- Make a Google Doc with your roommates to document who's bringing what so you don't all move in with duplicate items. No one really needs 4 toasters!
- Set ground rules for you and your roommates early. Communicate how and when bills will be paid, how the apartment will be cleaned, what the expectations everyone has in regards to quiet times, visitors, and shared spaces.

Make sure to revisit these agreements to keep conflicts at a minimum, and talk to

- your roommates when problems start to arise. Also look into Venmo or Splitwise; both are free apps to help split costs like utilities.
- Learn your living community's rules. Are there specific rules for noise, visitors, parking, or items you can't have in the apartment that you will be expected to follow?
- Make the move easier by seeing what you can send directly to the store in Auburn/Opelika or mail directly to your new place. Walmart, Bed Bath and Beyond, and Target often allow you to ship items directly to the store and sometimes it can be convenient to ship some items directly to your apartment through online stores or if you have an Amazon Prime Student Account. This can leave valuable

- space in your car when moving here
- Don't forget to update your local address with any banks, magazines or groups that typically send mail to you and update your information in AU Access too.
- Once you get here, make sure to thoroughly inspect the place before moving in. Document anything that is wrong, broken, or missing and talk with the landlord ASAP so you are not charged for the damage when it is time for you to leave.
